On Monday 8th. October 1979 at 1535 hrs. the Wr.L. from Station A2. Southmead responded to a call of Fire at No. 16, Church Road, Stoke Bishop. On arrival they found a large luxury detached house emitting heavy smoke from under all the tiles across the entire roof area, the first and ground floor windows blackened by smoke and cracking with the heat, and on a closer inspection found a large part of the ground floor well alight. To the rear of the building fire had broken out through a ground floor window, and an adjacent single storey extension was well alight, including the roof.

Two B.A. men from A2. on instructions from their Officer-in-Charge Sub O. Hutchings, made an entry with a jet through the front door to the hallway which was well alight. Pumps were increased to 3. On arrival of the Wr.T. from Station A1. Temple, Stn. O. Jack Allen in charge, two men from his crew dressed in B.A. and with a jet went to the rear of the building, to tackle the fire and gain entry.

At 1550 hrs. D.O. Britton sent an informative message "Dwelling house, detached, ground floor well alight, 2 Jets, 4 B.A. in use"

As soon as the third pump arrived from Station A1. Temple, their crew were put to work to search the premise. With the fire now coming under control, all Mains services were isolated, and D.O. Britton sent the 'Stop' message at 1557 hrs.

Because of the suspicious circumstances of the fire A.D.O.
Kennedy of 'A' Division F.P. was brought in to assist the C.I.D. in determining the cause, as in the previous weekend a number of fires in that locality, all involving large, single, luxury homes had occured under 'Doubtful Origins'.

Following investigation, the seat of the fire was found to have been in the games room, and there were signs of forced entry into the house. The owners wife had been in the house only one hour before the Brigade had been called. Meanwhile the Police had apprehended a woman at the scene of the fire, who fitted the description of a woman seen present at other fires in the area, and had taken her to the Police Station.

The owner and his wife were taken around the house accompanied by a Fire and Police Officer, the only item missing being a transistor radio, it was later found in the possession of the apprehended woman. Later that evening the woman made a statement admitting to starting the fire, and maybe starting others. She was charged and appeared the following day at the Magistrates Court, where she was remanded in custody for reports, and to appear at Crown Court. Her motive is not really clear, except that she does not like people owning luxury homes, and her victims were invairiably connected with the world of Finance, 16, Church Road, being owned by Mr. Roberts who is the Area Trustee and Investment Manager for the National Westminster Bank.

CHEMICAL INCIDENT A46 ROMAN CAMP, 11th. OCTOBER 1979

At approximately 1025 hrs. on Thursday 11th. October 1979, a flat-bedded articulated heavy goods vehicle left the M4 motorway at junction 18 (Tormarton) and proceeded in a northerly direction along the A46. Shortly afterwards the driver indicated his intention to turn on to the Chipping Sodbury/Yate road. It was at this point that a police crew who were maintaining observation on passing vehicles noted that the sheeted down load was apparently "Leaking and Steaming". Sensing that something was amiss, the police officers acted quickly in preventing the lorry from following its intended course into a relatively built-up area, and re-directed it along the A46 and eventually causing it to stop near the old Roman Camp. It was shortly after this that the driver explained to the police that his load consisted of mixed chemicals, bound for a nearby (?) trading estate on the other side of Yate.

At this stage it was decided that the Fire Brigade should be called in, and an emergency call was put in to Brigade Control. Wr.L.'s were immediately despatched from Stations A7 Yate and B7 Kingswood and staff Assistant Divisional Officer Brian Bowden was also sent on. Upon arrival at the scene and having removed the plastic sheeting, it was ascertained that the load consisted of 54 x 45 litre plastic carboys of varying concentrates of hydrochloric acid, a number of 180 litre drums containing sodium chlorate and various other acids in numerous other types of 180 litre drums, and all held in place virtually by the sheeting down proceedure.

On ascertaining from the driver that the leaking was coming from the hydrochloric acid section of the load, the head-scratching began. Further confusion was caused when the driver stated that the "Leaking" was probably from water running off the tops of the drums where they had been washed down after filling and sealing (?). This did not of course account for the fuming whereupon it was decided to have two crews of two men don chemical suits and breathing apparatus and remove that section of the load from the vehicle. When the carboys were on the ground, they were examined by brigade personnel for leaks and structural defects. When all the carboys had been removed, it was ascertained that an alarmingly high percentage (95%) had not been securely 'capped'. The plastic caps had not been screwed down sufficiently to prevent leakage (indicated by a bubbling of the limestone in the road metal and surrounding soil). Of these, 9 could not subsequently be tightened by the crews to prevent leakage, and in fact two were physically fractured to the extent that they permitted a continuous stream of fluid to flow from them with resultant extensive fuming off.

At this stage it was decided to gently wash off the bed of the vehicle, and also the surfaces of the carboys, subsequently reloading the lorry and removing it from the scene, to be dealt with by the police. The defective section of the load was held at the scene pending the arrival of personnel from the consignee's site from Yate. Transfer of the commodity was thereafter effected and escorted by police and fire brigade to its destination.

A few points of interest were noted during the incident viz,

1) The use of a flat-bedded vehicle which can so easily spill its load if involved in a road traffic accident.

- 2) All chemicals within the load were clearly marked in accordance with "Packaging and Labelling of Dangerous Substances Regulations" (effective March 1979) thus allowing the A.D.O. in charge to quickly identify the apparent course of action to be taken. (College notes do come in handy sometimes ::)
- 3) It was pleasing to note the willingness of Police, Environmental Health Officers, Drainage and Water Engineers, to accept that the Fire Brigade were in charge of the incident and that theirs was a supporting role.
- 4) Equally, it was disconcerting to have the Police Officer in charge at the time, instruct that the Press were not required at the scene without consulting the senior Fire Officer present, and also to read that a Police spokesman was later reported in the Press, as stating that there was no danger in the situation.
- We never did find out what was in the three bags (unmarked) all wrapped in clear PVC. It was nt in the manifest the driver said he didn't know (?) it looked like ordinary cement it could have been one of many perhaps something like phosphorous oxychloride, a grey-green powdery substance (4 WE), giving the equations:-

Phosphorous oxychloride plus cold water = 20 minutes plus bang

When asked at an incident about the Tremcards carried in his cab, a driver replied that he had collected about two dozen of them - just in case he happened to be carrying that substance - and had forgotten to pick up one from the despatcher's office. All makes the Fireman's life easier, of course !!

Each year since the disbandment of the Auxiliary Fire Service in 1968, the Bath Association has journeyed to many different parts of the Country to show the flag for Bath in these Annual Competitions, which are open to Ex-Auxiliary Fire Service, Local Authority and Industrial Fire Brigade Teams.

Twice before the Bath team have brought home the Ind. Coope Trophy for coming second in the Four Men Hydrant Drill, this year however their endeavours were amply rewarded by winning both events entered, namely the Four Men

Hydrant Drill (Dry) in 37 seconds, for which they were awarded the Basildon Bond Cup, and the Four Men Featherweight Pump Drill (Wet) in 54 seconds, for which the Hartman Cup was awarded.

For those interested in details, the two drills were as follows:-

Four Men Hydrant - 4 75ft. lengths of hose, one branchpipe, standpipe & key.

The drill is two parts, timing continuous.

First Part: Run 15ft. to appliance line, pick up gear and carry to hydrant line, fix standpipe and key, run out three lenghs of hose, add the branchpipe, and place it on the ground. On the completion of this first part, the non-drilling Captain signals the commencement of the second part.

Second Part: Replace second length (presumed burst) and tie a knot in the male end of the presumed burst length.

Four Men Featherweight Pump - 3 8ft. lengths of suction as supplied for use with the

A.F.S. Pump. These will be placed on the ground, on either side, and close
as possible to the pump. The single length with the strainer attached on one
side, and the other two lengths on the other side, with the male couplings
on the suction eye line. 1 pair suction wrenches as issued. 3 75ft. lengths
of hose. 1 'A' type branch with 5" nozzle.

The four men crew stand facing the appliance on a start line 20ft. from the pump. An A.F.S. Featherweight Pump is used, the engine running.

A starting signal is given by the non-drilling Captain, the crew runs to the pump, 5ft. from the start line, the crew will break a ray, thus starting the timing gear. They will connect three lengths of suction and place in the dam; run out one line of delivery hose comprising three lengths, fix a branch, and knock down a target with the jet. The falling of the target stops the timing gear.

The financial outlay for the Competitions is entirely borne by the teams participating, who enter after the minimum of training.

The successful team in both instances were Leading Fireman Richard Neate, Fireman Chris Sage, Fireman Ian Groves, Fireman Alan Groves, all under the Captaincy of Sub O. Gordon Smyth (Brigade Driving Training School). The enthusiasm shown by the members of this Annual event was really first class, and certainly makes the continuation of the Association very worthwhile.

BEST WISHES TO STATION OFFICER JACK ALLEN ON HIS RETIREMENT.

We wish Station Officer Jack Allen of Station A1. Temple, a long and happy retirement, when he leaves the brigade on November 16th. 1979. His Fire Service career began in 1942, when as a lad of 16 yrs. he joined the N.F.S. at Patchway and for two years was a messenger, and eventually yes eventually, as a Fireman. In February 1944, he was conscripted for work in the Coal Mines, and for the next four years worked in the Durham and Somerset Coalfields.

Jack then joined the Bristol Fire Brigade and Ambulance Service in the rank of Fireman on the 23rd. May 1949, and duly attended for initiation at Fire Station No.1 Bridewell Street. I wonder if he remembers his training officers comments at the end of his recruits school when Mr. G.H.Carlton remarked "This man has a retentive memory, and enjoys answering questions at lecture periods". Perhaps an understatement of his sharp wit, and never a lack of reply of any sort!

Jack was promoted in October 1960 to the rank of Leading Fireman, and then on to Sub Officer in May 1961 and posted to Station No. 5. Ashton Drive. The lure of the Brigade Training School pulled him into their ranks, and in November 1962 he took up the baton, until December 1963. He attended a B.A. Instructors Course at London Fire Brigade in 1965 at Southwark. Jack was promoted to Station Officer in April 1974, and posted to A1. Temple.

Right from his early days Jack was a keen all-round sportsman, particularly at Cricket and Foctball. He also showed considerable physical strength, although in latter years his chest has slipped slightly, due I suspect to the extraordinary quantity of food and drink that he finds necessary to consume. No doubt the canteen profits of Green Watch will now take a tumble, as Jack's 'Topping Up' routine will no longer take place. He has always been proud to be a member of this brigade, and always gave brigade matters absolute priority over his other interest of farming and animal husbandry, his professional skill in these matters being exceptional, particularly in the breeding and breaking in of horses.

Cliff Allen (Brigade Supplies Office, H.Q.) told me an interesting tale of when, one winter, Jack was leaving home for work and he saw his wife Pat fall flat on her back in the snow, complete with rubber boots and two large buckets of food for the animals. This gave him a very worrying moment, when suddenly his face brightened with a look of inspired inspiration, and he remarked "I know, I'll buy her two smaller buckets". This typifies Jack's humour and their is no doubt that he will be greatly missed in the brigade by everyone. The best of luck Jack, to you and your family.



Sub Officer Peter Coles of 'A' Division Fire Prevention, recently returned from a 12 month post-graduate course at Edinburgh University, during which time he gained a Master of Science (M.Sc.) degree in Fire Safety Engineering. To qualify for the course he had obtained an Open University degree (B.A.) in Science and Technology subjects.

The course at Edinburgh consisted of four main sections; The science of Fire, The evaluation of Risk. Fire protection engineering and Fire-fighting Technology, taking the form of nine months of formal classroom studies, experimental work in laboratories and short projects. The remaining three months were set aside for the writing of a thesis on any subject dealt with during the first part of the course. Peter chose the topic "A hazard analysis of the transportation of Liquid Petroleum Gas by road and rail".

The M.Sc. is the only post-graduate course of its type in the world, (although there are several undergraduate (B.Sc.) courses in the United States) and it is usually attended by more overseas than U.K. students, drawn this year as far afield as Costa Rica and Hong Kong.

At present the team are training very hard for the Grand Priors Trophy Competition to be held in London on the 11th. December, 1979 where they will represent the Fire Brigades of Great Britain against winning teams from all other major organisations in the country.


