The cover picture of this issue shows the scene at the South Stand, Eastville Stadium on on 17th August 1980. Station Officer Ivor Player arrived to find the South Stand well alight. He was confronted by the Eastville Market Stall Holders packing away their wares as the Market was in the process of closing. This made access to the Stand very difficult because of the vans, partly dismantled Stands and crowds watching the fire.

The next problem was getting adequate water supplies for an effective attack on the fire, and pumps were set into the River Frome separator tanks. Intense heat and rapid fire spread made fire fighting operations extremely arduous.

Another major blow for Bristol Rovers who have been plagued with bad luck for the last couple of seasons.

Verena from Brigade Headquarters hopes this is the end of a bad run for Rovers and they should progress to their rightful position in the 1st Division.

A grand total of £1,265 was raised from the sponsored cycle ride on the 15th June. £316 goes to Frenchay Burns Unit.

Station C2 raised £337, followed by Station A2 who raised £206.

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE FIRE BRIGADE AT THORNBURY

Thornbury Parish Fire Brigade began in September 1898 when Inspector Gotts of Bristol City Fire Brigade was asked to advise the Thornbury Parish Council on the best type of fire-extinguishing equipment to guard the town in the event of fire. His advice was to purchase 500 ft of canvas hose in 100 ft sections, a hose cart of the new London pattern with a telescopic ladder, two standpipes, a breeching piece, three branch pipes with $\frac{1}{2}$ in. nozzles, two hydrant keys and one hand-pump of the new London Brigade. The appliances arrived in April 1899 at a total cost of £48. 12s. 2d.

It was later suggested that the Brigade purchase a manual engine and Mr. G. Stafford Howard, the owner of Thornbury Castle, offered to buy a new six-man manual engine and this offer was accepted. The appliance arrived in 1900, the same year that Mr. A.H. Wilkins was appointed captain, a position he retained until 1938.

Captain Wilkins was extremely strict and insisted upon the men looking smart at turn-outs. The firemen had to line up in order and they would then be inspected. If they were satisfactory the captain would take a pinch of snuff and then give the order to 'mount'.

The method of call-out in those days was through the police who told the call boy who in turn ran round the town to individuals giving the alarm.

In 1904 a new sixteen-man manual engine was purchased from Merryweather at a cost of £117. 15s. Od. and the outstanding event of the year occurred when the Brigade was unable to borrow horses from the Swan Hotel and had to pull the machine manually to a fire at Whitfield $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles away. When they arrived they found that they did not have enough hose to reach the fire so they had to get help and extra equipment from the Earl of Ducie Estate appliance. The captain's report stated that the men arrived home 'in a very tired condition'.

In 1910 the Brigade was given notice to quit the fire station by Mr. Weatherhead who had purchased the building. The Brigade then moved to a new station at a cost of £8. Os. Od. per year rental. Other costs fixed that year included the hiring of horses, 10s per annum and £1. Os. Od. for the driver; a fee of 5s. per year was fixed for firemen who attended all drills.

A number of men called to the Colours during the Great War and all the vacancies were filled from those who remained, with the exception of the call boy.

In 1922 new hose was required and the following estimates were received: three lengths of 100 ft hose from Merryweathers, £22. 18s. 6d., from McGregor & Co., £22. 10s. Od. Estimates for other items included new fire tunics with brass buttons £2. 2s. 6d., fireman's trousers £1. 2s. 6d., rubber boots 16s. 6d.

In 1927 the Brigade stopped using horses to take the engine to fires and started to use a motor lorry instead. The fee for the use of this vehicle was £2.0s.0d. per fire. A fire later that year occurred at Alveston and the lady who occupied the premises refused to pay the cost of the appliance turning out as she did not call for the Fire Brigade herself, and it was after this incident that the Brigade was instructed not to turn out until the occupier of the house concerned signed a form agreeing to pay the £2.0s.0d. fee. Thornbury became the proud possessors of a Leyland motor fire engine with means of conveying firemen in 1929, the cost being £450.


It was at this time that the Parish Council decided that the cost of running the Brigade was becoming too much for them to bear and control of the Brigade was passed to the Rural District Council and in 1930 they built the fire station which has now been replaced for £626.

During the 1930's the Brigade covered the area from Sharpness to Severn Beach and also responded to a number of calls within the Bristol area. Their 'new' motor fire engine was last seen in Bristol in the late 40's after one of the air raids. After the war Thornbury became part of the Gloucestershire Fire Service and later with the advent of local government reorganisation part of the County of Avon Fire Brigade. In the early days of the Brigade all the members were locals but with the growth of Thornbury the personnel now hail from all parts of the country.

Thornbury is a retained station with a complement of fourteen firemen, four leading firemen and one sub officer, commanded by Station Officer Paxford. The station responds to approximately 150 calls per year, some of which are to 'make-ups' within the city. The station is justly proud of its long history and its existing members strive to maintain the best traditions of the service started all those years ago when technology was unknown and firemanship the main objective.




EXHIBIT OF COUNTY OF AVON SIMON SNORKEL AT HANOVER, INTERSCHUTZ '80

"FOR SAFETY IN CASE OF FIRE

I have located a tall pair of stepladders in the toilet on the top floor. In the event of persons being trapped on the upper floors, access can thus be gained to the loft in the ceiling immediately above the top flight of stairs. Once inside (take care not to put feet through ceiling - i.e. tread on rafters!) there is a roof access hatch forward and to the left, (you would feel the draught if not visible). Once outside there is completely safe access along the front to all houses in this row.

Please do not go out on the roof otherwise, as it is in poor condition (brittle lead), but an inspection of the loft with a torch using ladder would be helpful in case of emergency".

The Brigade First Aid Team were successful in winning a total of six trophies at the above mentioned competition. The team retained the 'Rowe' Cup for overall winners, the 'ECLP' Cup for highest individual test overall, the 'Curtis' Shield for highest No. 1., and the "St. John Ambulance" Cup for highest No. 3. The team regained the "Redruth Divisional" Cup for Team Captains, and the "Redruth Brigade" Cup for second in the team test.

This success was achieved after no less than three "tie breaks", and in accordance with the competition rules, the Team Captain undertakes all tie situations.

The team comprised myself (Captain), Fireman Causon, No. 2; Sub Officer Smith, No. 3; Fireman Bowden, No. 4 and Fireman Wilson (res.), gained a total of 402 points out of 500 with English China Clays Cornwall (men) second, with a total of 398.

Jobs around the Brigade worthy of special mention

Who steals the limelight in this magazine? It must be Blue Watch, C5 Bedminster, Station Officer Mike Mullany's Watch. A superb rescue from 30, Gatehouse Close, Hartcliffe on the 15th September. Two persons assisted down ladders and Sub Officer Brian Counsell carried a 25 year old young lady down from the first floor by ladder. She was unconscious, overcome by smoke. From the time of call to arrival was three minutes, and all the rescues were carried out within three minutes of arrival. Well done Blue Watch.

Green Watch, Temple, excels in a mud rescue at Cumberland Road on the 1st September 1980. The E.T. and WrT called by police to recover a man from the mud on the river bank with the use of a TL and Paraguard Stretcher. He was quickly retrieved, washed down and sent to hospital. Meanwhile there were two police officers to assist out and Pete Noble s boots. The mission failed regarding the boots and following a reprimand by his Officer-in-Charge for failing to take care of personal kit, is buying a new paid for $12\frac{1}{2}$ p per week. This being stopped at source.

A foxy rescue for Sub Officer Stan Tingle's crew on the WrT Green Watch, Station C5 Bedminster. While the above rescue was taking place Stan and his crew were taking soundings around Ashton Park, seeking a dog which had gone underground for four hours. After several bore holes were dug, a little black mongrel dog was recovered making a fuss of its heroes. Just after returning 'Mischief' to his owner, out steps a fox, a little dusty and worn. Giving the surrounding activity the once-over, he ran towards the river.

Station Officer Sharp and his crew avert a serious situation at Watts Garage, Weston-Super-Mare. Three acetylene cylinders involved in fire. Cooling jets were brought into operation. Valve on cylinders closed, then the cylinders submersed in water.

White Watch at A1 Temple are rumoured to be attending Bristol Zoo for first aid and after care of reptiles, following a fire at a flat in Pembroke Road, Clifton. They came across a pair of Pythons, and the Officer-in-Charge of the incident Sub Officer Alan Totterdell was surprised to learn that none of his Watch were keen to render first aid to this pair who may have been suffering from the effect of smoke.

Sub Officer Bob Williams from A3 Avonmouth attended Atlantic Way, Avonmouth. Man trapped under fork-lift truck. Bob and his crew found a young man trapped by his legs under an overturned fork lift truck. With his crew and what equipment they had on the WrT, an effort was made to remove some of the weight until the arrival of the MrT. Meanwhile the Port of Bristol Authority ambulance men administered entonox gas. On arrival of the MrT the difficult and delicate task of cutting away and lifting began, and within twenty minutes the man was released.


Station Officer Jefferies attended a pressing engagement at a printing works in Bedminster when a young man had his hand trapped in a printing press. A difficult situation faced them, having to dismantle part of the press and cutting away the roller. Whilst the operation was underway, a doctor attended the casualty, giving pain-killing injections.



Station Officer Colin Morris, B1 Bath, turned out to a 'Persons Reported' in Hayesfield Park, Bath. On arrival they found that a 70 year old woman had jumped from the first floor some 30 ft. but with no apparent injuries. After making entry and dealing with the fire, it was found that the woman had not left her room for some years. The whole house was occupied by family whom she had not spoken to or associated with since the war.

As you can see by the photograph of the room, what a potentially hazardous situation.

A2 Southmead responded to a motorcyclist in the Avon Gorge off Bridge Valley Road. On arrival Sub Officer Dave Miller found the motorcyclist some 50 ft. down the Gorge with an ambulance man. They climbed down, secured the ambulance man, strapped the casualty in the Paraguard stretcher and hauled him up. A first class piece of team work by all involved.

IT'S A MESS-UP 1980

I think our motto for this year should have been 'It's not the winning that counts, it's the way you play the game', which unfortunately for us spelt DISASTER. Next year, perhaps, it could spell SUCCESS.






