The Chief Fire Officer Mr Fred Ponsford, receives the Queens Fire Service Medal from Sir John Wills, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Avon.

The Chief served in the war as a glider pilot with the Royal Army Glider Regiment, finishing his time as a Warrant Officer.

He was involved in many famous campaigns such as Arnhem, the Rhine Crossing and D-Day, as can be imagined this was a very hazardous occupation and very few pilots came through unscathed.

At the end of the war Mr Ponsford joined the Fire Service in Gloucester and after a year transferred to Bristol. He subsequently worked his way through the ranks to become Chief Officer in 1980.

The whole Brigade has reason to be pleased and proud of the award to the Chief in recognition of his services to the Brigade and as Mr Ponsford said himself, he received the award on behalf of the members of the Brigade for their courage and dedication to duty, especially during very arduous times last April.

All too often, firemen who are killed or seriously injured protecting or saving life get little or no recognition, so it was very pleasing that this award received National press coverage, as normally the only national press coverage we see is that of disputes etc. As one news editorial read 'All too often we take the Fire Service for granted, by virtue of their work it is hazardous and dangerous but let this be a reminder that these men are always prepared to go where people or our property are at risk and give their all'.

Following repeated queries from the media 'Was the Chief Officer actually at St Pauls?' I was able to give a positive 'Yes' as the Chief Fire Officer is still a 'Fireman' and as such saw fit to be with his men and lead them in these troubles.

Keiths involvement with the Fire Service started in 1942 when he was a messenger boy.


During his service he had a long and distinguished involvement with the community which was well noted at his retirement social, held on station, by the number of presentations made to him by members of other emergency services.

There have been so many, and not


