

Ralph joined the Somerset Brigade when he was 22 after serving with the Royal Navy in the war. He distinguished himself while on the battleship 'Duke of York', on 'Escort' destroyers and his first firefighting experience when he was torpedoed north of the Cape escorting a Russian fleet.

35 of Ralph's fellow sailors died on that day. He was one of the firefighting party on HMS Mounsey, using what was left of the ship's installation to deal with fire in a hold containing depth charges. Not the best, or maybe the best, way of starting his firefighting career. Like being thrown into the deep end!

Ralph says he has enjoyed every minute of his time in the Brigade and has so many memories, some not good, some comical. To record two:—

Being called out by steam hooter at the old Gas Works at Clevedon.

When he spent two days at the Avonmouth oil fire in 1951.

Mention must also be made of his last night of duty. It was the Station's Annual Inspection. It was voted to send any comments on his performance that evening to his home address. "No comment!"

Ralph is married to a very special lady, Irene, has five daughters between the ages of eighteen and thirty-two and now two grandsons and a grand-daughter.

#### A FIERY HAUNT

According to a report in the Western Daily Press, in October, 1975, a ghost is supposed to haunt the Avon fire brigade's new £1,200,000 headquarters in Temple Back, Bristol.

It has been seen no less than nine times.

The apparition, which walks through the doors, lowers the temperature in centrally-heated rooms and vanishes into thin air, appears only at night.

A cook, Mrs Iris Rhodes, has seen it three times. "I was standing counting my money at about 8.30 p.m. when I saw someone standing by the pillar," she told a reporter.

"As I went towards him, he disappeared."

On another occasion, she chased him downstairs with a glass of water.

"I thought someone was playing a joke on me, but he had vanished," she said. "A person could not have got through the locked doors at the bottom of the stairs."

The ghost looked as if it was between thirty and thirty-six and was wearing a large mackintosh. "He had ruddy cheeks, looked ever so healthy and was of medium height," said Mrs Rhodes.

Some firemen who have seen the ghost say he was wearing mediaeval dress. One theory is that it could be the ghost of one of the Knights Templar, a crusading and banking order, which owned the area from 1140 until 1308, when they were arrested for heresy and blasphemy.

#### **Brigade suggestion scheme**

At a recent meeting of the Brigade Technical Committee, the following suggestions were considered and thought to be of value to the Brigade, and will be adopted as a matter of Brigade Policy.

Fireman G. R. Bayliss, A1 Temple.

The utilisation of the reverse side of accident signs as warning notices when decontamination areas are set up.

Station Officer P. Causon, B6 Speedwell. The provision of foam rubber to act as a cushion to prevent damage to plastic foam drums carried on appliances.

Red Watch, C5 Bedminster.

Provision of walkways for use on mud as encountered in the River Avon, when recovering persons or animals trapped.



The foregoing suggestions were considered to be of a high technical merit and were recognised by financial awards in each case.

The Committee thank all those members of the Brigade who have come forward with suggestions, and hope that they and others will continue to put forward their ideas whereby they are assured they will receive the closest examination by the Technical Committee.

# Call out\_

### PENDENNIS ROAD, STAPLE HILL

Extensive damage to Standing House—lucky escape for 2.

On Saturday 14th November 1981, shortly after 8 a.m. a call was received to say that there had been an explosion in a house in Pendennis Road, Staple Hill. Shortly after, a large number of calls started coming in for the same incident, so a further appliance was sent.

On arrival Station B6 Speedwell and B7 Kings-wood crews found a shop and house completely destroyed and a third house impending collapse. There was confusion with no-one sure of the location or whereabouts of occupants, so the crews were split up and an immediate search instigated. Following calls for help by some neighbours, it was revealed that a lady was trapped by her legs in the debris. Three local people were with her but were unable to release the lady in question.

The lads from Kingswood and Speedwell Fire Stations entered the area where she was trapped, releasing her legs using hydraulic rescue equip-

ment and sheer physical force. Even after it was thought that all persons had been accounted for, a complete search of the debris was carried out to ensure that no passers-by or children playing in the area had been trapped. Unfortunately Mrs. Kathleen Ireland did not recover from her injuries and died in Frenchay Hospital.

Surrounding houses had windows blown out, people were reported being thrown from beds due to the blast and tiles were ripped off roofs 100 metres away.

The Brigade were on the scene for over 30 hours salvaging other premises, sheeting down roofs and providing illumination. We were also requested by the police to salvage from the stricken premises valuables and undamaged articles.

The Chairman of the Public Protection Committee, Councillor Terry Walker, Chairman of the Fire Brigade (Sub) Committee, Councillor C. Langham, Councillor Blestowe, who is a member of the Public Protection Committee and also the Ward Councillor for the area visited the scene to see the role and work of the Fire Service.

Divisional Officer Southard received a letter from the Chief Superintendent of Avon and Somerset Police (for the area), praising the work of the Brigade and the conduct of the Firemen at the scene. He remarked on the professional way in which the firemen conducted themselves, giving the other Emergency Services confidence in what could have been an unknown situation. He also praised their pure physical effort and determination at this incident

#### Withywood School



Severe fire damage to Rural Science Block, Withywood School.

In the early hours of the morning several calls were received to Withywood School. On the arrival of Station Officer Mick Mullancy and his crew from Bedminster they found the Rural Science Block well alight. Two jets were immediately brought into use. It transpired that the buildings had been broken into and some vandalism carried out, so the Fire Investigation Team were called in.

Over £100,000 worth of damage caused again by sick vandals.

#### Fire at Bristol General Hospital, Guinea Street

Shortly after lunch on a Sunday a fire was spotted in the roof of the General Hospital. On arrival a complete section of roof running along Guinea Street above the Nurses' Home and some wards were found to be well alight.

Scaffolding already round the area gave easier access to the roof but with the age and construction of building, it proved to be a difficult fire to fight. A make-up message was sent and upon instructions of Divisional Officer Kennedy, evacuation of the affected area was instigated. The Chief Officer took charge of the incident and checked total evacuation.

Due to the good efforts of the crews attending, a good stop was made and the fire was confined to the original roof area over the Nurses Home, although appliances remained at the scene for some twenty hours, maintaining a watch and carrying out salvage operations.

The Chief Officer praised the Hospital staff for the most efficient way in which they conducted the evacuation. He also praised the patients for their tolerance, most of them being in a very uncomfortable situation as it is predominantly a surgical hospital and patients were removed with drips and bedridden patients had to be removed in beds or in wheelchairs.

#### Changs Take Away Chinese Clevedon Ralph Fryer's Finale

Station C2 Clevedon arrived to find the ground floor of the Take-Away well alight and were informed that the Chang's three children were missing. Despite intense heat and smoke, two men in breathing apparatus with a jet made entry to the first floor to search, while two F.B. 5X's were brought into use. Fortunately the children were out of the building. Severe damage was caused to the shop by fire, heat and smoke.

This was Ralph's last fire. Well done C2.

#### C1 Weston-Super-Mare

C1 Weston faced a very nasty hazard involving two LPG cylinders at a caravan fire at Landhouse Farm, Puxton, near Weston. On arrival they found a forty foot residential caravan alight. Two jets were immediately brought into use. They then found two 45 kilogramme propane cylinders also involved in the fire. One burning fiercely at the valve. Both cylinders were heated. So a cooling jet was brought into use. They were carried and submersed in a nearby pond. The caravan was severely damaged. The occupier had not followed the manufacturer's instructions for installing a wood burning stove.

#### B5 and B4

A tragic loss for a family of four at Compton Dando. As the picture tells you, a very rapid and severe fire swept through the home of Mr. Ronald Ford and his family. Tragically, Mr. Ford's daughter, Teresa, and her husband Nigel, who were recently




married and awaiting their own accommodation, had all their presents stored in the bungalow. These, along with all the family's possessions, with the exception of the clothes they stood up in, were lost in the fire. The type of incident at which a Fireman feels upset for he is unable to salvage those personal belongings which mean so much to people.

#### A1 Temple

A call in the early hours to Armoury Square off Stapleton Road, revealed this tragic and bizarre fire situation. Unfortunately, the occupier lost his life.

He had affixed mattresses, etc, covering



windows and doors. Each room was done up as a family shrine. When the lads from A1 White Watch entered the building they were faced with a very dangerous situation, a tremendous build-up of flammable liquid vapours in a super-heated atmosphere. Ventilation was carried out as rapidly as possible. Branch men were at the ready for any flash-over that may have occurred. Every part of the house was severely damaged by fire, heat and smoke.

#### B1 Bath—Superglue

Look before you sit—It may sound comical but not for the man involved. B1 Bath were called to the Bath Bus Station to find a man stuck to a lavatory pan. This sounds like a Peter Seller's scene but you must be involved to realise how horrendous it is for the poor innocent victim of such a silly and dangerous prank.

Arriving, the Brigade found the man stuck to the ceramic pan by both thighs and buttocks. It was difficult to work in the confined space of the closet. The lavatory pan had to be removed complete, taken into the wash room where an angle grinder

was used for the delicate task of cutting away the pan.

The lads were able to remove most parts of the pan, although some sections of the rim went with him to hospital. The rest of the "operation" on the victim took four hours by careful nursing at the Royal United Hospital. Just warm water and washing-up liquid was the answer.

The young man had a "quiet rest" on his trip, a trip I am sure he will never forget! I am sure his best memories of Bath are the help given him by the Brigade and the Hospital.

#### Toby.

Control received a telephone call to say a dog could be heard howling somewhere in the River Frome between Houlton Street and the roundabout at the M32. A Water Tender from A1 responded and eventually, using hand torches, Toby was found shivering on a small piece of dry ground at the side of the river. Fortunately he had a dog tag giving his name and owner's address, and it transpired that the dog had been missing for ten hours.

#### Recipe of the Month Winter Soup

#### **Cauliflower and Tomato**

- 1 large Cauliflower
- 2 lbs Tomatoes
- 2 pints Chicken stock (cubes)
- 1 large Onion
- 1 tsp Vinegar
- 1 oz Butter
- 2 tbs Double Cream
- Salt and pepper to taste

Cook cauliflower in salted water for 15–20 mins and mash. While cauliflower is cooking, slice onion and gently heat in butter until transparent. Add cauliflower, skinned tomatoes, vinegar, sugar. Cook for 5 minutes. Liquidise or press through fine sieve.

If you have a freezer, now tuck it away. To use immediately or after freezing, add cream and warm, do not boil.

An extra touch for a cold day, add small fried croutons. That's a meal in itself.

Next issue I shall give general advice on soup making and another recipe.

### 'Do it yourself' can be fun

Early in 1980 Gordon Feaver of B6 Speedwell and Ian Morrissey, an Almondsbury policeman, decided to obtain a fire appliance for preservation.

Several vehicles were considered, but they settled on Bedford NGL 664. This appliance was built in 1963 as a pump escape for the City of Bath Fire Brigade, where it remained until 1976, when it was transferred to the Brigade Training School.

It was disposed of by the brigade in may 1980 and then purchased at auction in Cardiff.

Once returned to Bristol the task was to restore it to it's original condition. The first job was a repaint, inside and out. Several mechanical problems were ironed out and the next step was to find a wheeled escape.

Fortunately, a wheeled escape was up for disposal, and this was purchased, but in the vehicle's later years the trunnion bar had been removed and a long and frustrating search proved negative. After several days of welding, drilling and trial and error, the trunnion bar from an E.R.F. was fitted. Equipment was gradually being obtained from various sources and the restoration was slowly taking shape.

The first major outing was to the 1980 Bus Rally in August when the appliance was awarded the prize for the best fire engine. The next step was in October 1980 when permission was obtained to use the facilities of a disused garage in Filton where the vehicle could be stored and work on it continued through the winter months.

By Spring 1981 the restoration had been completed and "NIGEL", as it had now been nicknamed, was completely re-equipped to it's 1960's standard.

The summer saw it's appearance at various fêtes, shows and rallies, notably the Cardiff Historic Vehicle Rally (1st prize), Bristol Bus Rally (Runner-up) and Kenilworth Fire Engine Rally (Runner-up in post 1955 vehicles). An invitation was received to appear at the Science Museum Open Day at Wroughton, where it lined up with some twenty other preserved fire appliances, and it also attended at U.S.A.F. Fairford for the conclusion of Fire Safety Week.

Towards the end of 1980, Alan Grimstead moved into the Filton garage with his Commer/Whitson Type "A" Water Tender MYB 902.

This appliance was originally supplied to Somerset Fire Brigade and posted to Paulton in November 1950, where it remained until April 1961. It then became a reserve and was finally disposed of in 1965.

It was purchased by Rank Xerox, Micheldean, for the Works Brigade and scrapped in 1979. Alan then purchased it for use at the Dean Forest Railway at Lydney.

Restoration was initially slow as it was stored in the open, but once under cover at Filton the prospects brightened up and Alan hopes to have it

on the road by next Spring. It will then be on show at the railway on certain weekends throughout the year

During the year the Group 3 grew to five members and in June 1981 they had donated an ex-City of Gloucester Dennis F12 Pump Escape which had been standing in the open for the last ten years.

This vehicle is in a very sorry state, but eventually it is hoped to have it running and fully restored.

The next problem to be fixed is accommodation, as the garage site is likely to be redeveloped in the New Year, and so the search for premises has started over again.

The long term aim of the Group is to establish in the Bristol area a small museum of West Country fire appliances rather than let them all disappear without trace

By next summer there will, hopefully, be two appliances on the road which can be brought along to fêtes or open days. All we ask is a small donation towards the cost of petrol.
